## **OCTOBER FIELD TRIP TO SHADOW BAY (A Sunday Morning Trip) John Cento**

Ever skim through one of Dr. Walter Taylor's books and yearn to visit to the featured special places of Florida's flora? On Sunday, October 11th, you can do just that. Orange County's Shadow Bay Park, former named Lake Cain and Marsha Park, is featured in Taylor's *Florida Wildflowers in Their Natural Communities* (pg 146) as an example of Rosemary Scrub. Dedicated staff and Chapter members have devoted time to preserve and restore this bit of ancient paradise in Southwest Orange County. This park has well marked trails including a sidewalk trail for Chapter members who could use the sure-footing. Because several Tarflower folks are familiar with the park, we will be able to guide our selves and set the pace. We will meet at 9:00 a.m. at the parking lot near the park office. After you enter the park, you will make a right turn towards the office. Restrooms are available in the back of the park - go straight instead of turning right to the office.

Study your scrub and join in the fun. After botanizing, we can find a suitable spot for a picnic lunch for those who can hang around after the adventure.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) State Wildlife Grants Program invites applications for its 2009 General Grant Cycle.

**Florida's State Wildlife Grants Program**, a part of Florida's Wildlife Legacy Initiative, the FWC manages Florida's State Wildlife Grants Program. This is a federally-funded matching grants program, which provides financial support for projects that address conservation needs identified in [Florida's Comprehensive Wildlife Conservation Strategy](#). This year's criteria are focused on the Legacy Initiative's priority habitats and filling data gaps on Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN). Preference will be given to projects that focus on both data gaps and priority habitats and that address multiple SGCN, partnerships, and climate change issues for Florida's fish and wildlife and their habitats. **SEPTEMBER FIELD TRIP TO JOHN'S LAKE** Pete Dunkelberg

Our September field trip was to a scrub area bordering John's Lake in Lake County, courtesy of Lake County Water Authority. The cloud cover and slight hint of rain kept us cool. We saw a great many scrub plants, from Hog Plum to our endangered endemic scrub buckwheat, *Eriogonum longifolium* var. *gnaphalifolium*, to the delicate *Polanisia tenuifolia*. This plant has a couple of common names:

clammyweed and pineland catch-fly. If that means anything to you, you are probably an old timer.

We saw examples of how scrub wildflowers including the buckwheat do better after a fire, and also observed what a difference a slight change in elevation makes in Florida. Due to the recent rains the lake was at a very high level so that scrub plants adapted to dry sand were very close to the water. One large live oak was three meters out in the lake, with *Sagittaria* growing between it and the shore. This tree must have



survived many episodes of high water. About half of us stayed for lunch at an open point on the lake, and as usual all had a good time.

Our next field trip will also be to a scrub environment, but a much more open one at Shadow Bay on the edge of Orlando. Shadow Bay features a Rosemary Bald and the largest variety of scrub plants you are ever going to find in such a small area. Don't miss it!

**GRANTS AVAILABLE FOR WATER EDUCATION, BOTH FOR COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS AND EDUCATORS**

The Lake County Water Authority Board has, for the 8th year in a row, approved a grant program for community groups and public/private school teachers to encourage freshwater resource awareness - The "Drop-by-Drop: You Make A Difference!" Mini-grants. These grants are awarded on an annual basis and are open to private, public schools, homeschool groups, community groups such as boy scouts, homeowner associations, and local municipalities.

**Drop-by-Drop: You Make A Difference! Mini-grant Program Accepting Applications:**

Since 2001 the Lake County Water Authority has awarded over \$286,000.00 in grant money to community groups and private and public school teachers. This grant program was developed to encourage local educators and community groups to promote water resource education and awareness.

Grant money has been used to purchase microscopes, purchase aquatic vegetation, create educational signs, purchase water test kits, aquatic nets, aquifer models, and fund field trips to Trout Lake Nature Center. ## ***AUGUST FIELD TRIP: Plant Taxonomy***



Our August field trip was a continuation of our introduction to plant families by Dr. Carolina Lane. We met at Spring Hammock in Seminole County where we could use the classroom and also see a large variety of wildflowers right outside. We had lots of sample plants brought by members, spread across several tables (the



plants, not the members). Everyone who came had a good time while learning more about natural Florida. This always happens on field trips; if you haven't been coming you should try it.

I'll try to illustrate just one plant family, the



*Asteraceae*. They're also called the *Compositae* because, as you can see in the pictures, what at first looks like one flower is really a composite of a bunch of little flowers (also called florets). Some of the florets have one of the large petals as their petal. These are

called ray florets, and all the others are called disk florets



because they are spread across the central disk of the flower.

There is one more floral character to look for, which settles the fact that something is in the aster family. If you



look at the back of the flower you will see a series of bracts (together called an involucre) which help hold the composite together. Even the *Asteraceae* are not always so obvious. You have to take a pretty close look at dogfennel, for instance, to see the composite pattern. (See photo, page 5)

The conference is May 20-23, 2010 at the Leon County Civic Center in Tallahassee. Go to the conference section of the FNPS website over the next couple of months for schedule information and updates.

FNPS will pursue proposing to the Florida legislature that they pass a resolution making the month of May officially known as 'Native Plant Appreciation month'.
